THROUGH MY EYES

A friend challenged me to share some of the dumb things that I have done. I said I would, but - wow - after all the years I have spent trying to forget about them?

And so as I sifted through my repressed memories a pattern emerged. Some of the dumbest things I've ever done were early in my marriage and involved Christmas gifts for my wife, Karen.

So this month I want to share "Three Things a New Husband Needs to Learn NOT to Do at Christmas."

Lesson One...

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The "Hissing Noise" The Homeowner Heard Was Natural Gas Dumping into the Basement

Recently our techs Michael and Marvin both averted situations involving improperly installed natural gas lines that at minimum saved major property damage and possibly lives.

Michael was dispatched on a Saturday service call for a hissing sound in the furnace. He assumed

that he would find a restricted air filter that was causing the noise - a relatively benign problem. What he found instead was very dangerous.

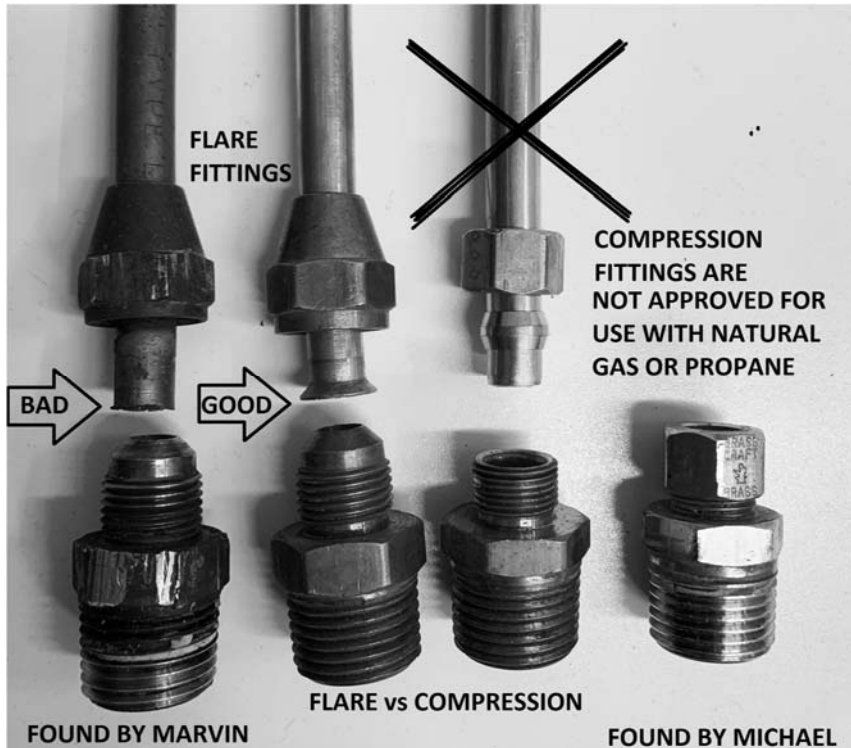
After introducing himself to the customer, he noted the smell of natural gas when he entered the house. He made a mental note to recommend a gas leak check. His concern

immediately escalated as he descended into the basement and the smell of gas became stronger. He quickly abandoned the idea that the hissing sound was a noise caused by the furnace filter - the furnace was off.

Scanning nearby he immediately discovered the problem: a copper

gas line had completely broken off at the fitting. The hissing sound was raw natural gas dumping into the basement! Seeing no accessible shutoff nearby, he raced up the stairs and then outside to find the main shutoff to the house at the meter.

After shutting off the gas and airing out the house, he inspected the problem. The damaged gas line was copper tubing that served a gas log in a fireplace. It had broken where the copper line had been attached with an unapproved connection to the original hard iron pipe

system. Instead of using an approved 'flare' fitting connection, whomever had installed it had used a compression fitting connection intended for use with water lines. (Shown in the photo above.)

A few days later, Marvin made a similar discovery for a different customer. In this situation, the correct flare fitting connection had been used, but whomever had installed it had not 'flared' the end of the tubing. This means that the tubing was straight and did not have the

(trumpet-like) bell shaped end. The 'flare' is needed to securely fasten the copper tubing, and without it, the tubing slipped easily out of the fitting when Marvin tested it.

Both cases were the result of bad workmanship – probably performed by unlicensed people that had not been properly trained. In Michael's situation, that a compression fitting was used on a gas line shows ignorance of the mechanical code and knowledge of accepted safe practices. In Marvin's situation, while the correct fitting was used, the installer lacked the ability or knowledge to do it correctly. Unfortunately, 'do-it-yourselfers' and handymen don't always recognize when their knowledge and/or abilities are deficient and professional expertise is required - as proven in these situations.

As dangerous as natural gas and propane can be, it is a good practice to have your home's entire gas delivery system professionally inspected periodically to ensure the safety of you and your family. At minimum, this can provide peace of mind – or it might reveal dangerous situations – like the ones Michael and Marvin discovered – and potentially save your home and your life. - Daniel Squires
